#### **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

#### 1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

As our college is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. We follow the curriculum designed by the said university. The university prepares yearly academic calendar mentioning about admission process, semester examination, holidays etc. On this basis, academic calendar committee of our college prepares academic and activity calendar for effective implementation. At the beginning of every session, the time table committee prepares time table and displays it on the notice board. Head of various departments assign work load to the teachers as per the prescribed university norms. Teachers then prepare teaching plan according to academic calendar and guidelines of the university, which include seminars, unit test, assignments, practical, delivery of lectures and tutorials. Every teacher maintains the academic diary and records of engaged lectures, practicals, seminars and other activities/programs conducted. Periodical meetings of Head of the departments are held with the principal to review and discuss the curriculum delivery. Periodically each department conducts departmental meeting adhering to discussion on syllabus review, practicals, departmental activity, planning for internal exam, seminars, programs. Students are given assignments, seminars and project under the supervision of the faculty. Various eminent faculty members from other institutions are invited frequently for guest-lectures so that the students get exposure to the current trends and the latest subject knowledge. ICT is used for effective teaching by the teachers of various departments. In addition to the chalk-board teaching, LCD Projectors, power point presentation is used to create students interest in the curricula. Students who actively participating in class-discussions, performing well in the examinations are encouraged by providing them extra books. Due care is taken of slow learners by taking remedial classes. Tutor-Ward (Mentor-Mentee) system is implemented to identify weaknesses and strengths. The skills learnt through extension activities like NSS, NCC, etc. help the students to learn time management, build self-esteem and implement goal setting. Feedback on teaching and curriculum is taken from the students to ensure better delivery and effective implementation of curriculum.

? Internal evaluation process of the college strictly adheres to the examination scheme and in accordance with Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University,

Amravati and the institution itself. ? The annual internal assessment process is planned by the examination committee constituted by the college and is implemented under the principal's guidance. ? The Principal addresses the students at the beginning of the academic session and complete assessment process is explained to them and copy of the same is displayed on the notice board. ? Same internal assessment process is explained to all the faculty members during college council and meeting of council of heads. ? It is mandatory for all departments to strictly follow the internal assessment process prescribed by examination committee. ? As a part of process, time table is prepared by the examination committee for the internal examination and students are informed about the same by notice board and through their regular class WhatsApp groups. ? Marks are displayed on the notice board tentatively. ? Students' grievances regarding exam marks are resolved at the earliest. ? Apart from the regular internal examination, activities like projects, seminars, quiz competition, assignments and PowerPoint presentations etc. also form a part of the internal assessment.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Academic Planning Committee formed by the college prepares the academic calendar and monitors its execution. The college being an affiliated institution to the governing university, adherence to the academic calendar approved by the affiliating university is observed. Before the commencement of any academic session, the 'Academic Planning Committee' prepares and finalizes the academic calendar in consultation with various stakeholders. The committee monitors the publicity of academic calendar. The academic calendar is made public by including it in the college prospectus and on the institutional website. The college has constituted an examination committee to look after the smooth conduct of university examinations and continuous internal evaluation at the institutional level. For internal examination / continuous assessment schemes, notices are circulated among the college staff also so that various activities like unit tests, assignments, etc. get conducted on the schedule prescribed by examination committee. standard procedure prescribed by the affiliating university is followed by the college to conduct semester end exams of theory and practical. Date, time, question papers and answer sheets are provided by the affiliating university. Evaluation of the answer books is done under the central assessment program in the university premises itself. Teachers of the college also participate in the evaluation process. Results are declared by the affiliating university.
